

## Abortion, Adoption & Social Services Policy

### Section 1: Abortion Policy

- Legal only up to 12 weeks After that point, abortion is banned except in cases of immediate risk to the mothers life or medically verified severe fetal abnormality.
- No abortion as birth control Repeated terminations will not be state-funded and will require mandatory counselling, contraception plans, and social review.
- Pre-abortion review All abortion requests must include in-person counselling, and a full explanation of alternatives: parenting, adoption, or state support.
- 48-hour reflection period Required between request and procedure. Emergencies require senior sign-off.
- No concealment for minors Schools and authorities must notify parents unless abuse is documented.
- End abortion exploitation Any content glorifying or fetishizing abortion will be criminalized.
- Mandatory adoption consideration In low-risk cases, mandated birth and adoption may replace abortion access under public funding.

### Section 2: Adoption Reform

- Priority placement in stable homes Faster processing and background vetting for prospective adoptive families.
- Support for adoptive families Include post-adoption therapy, mediation for sibling disputes, and estate planning education.
- Full transparency in records Lifelong access to unredacted adoption records unless sealed for safety.

- Accountability for adopters Misuse or financial exploitation of adopted children results in investigation and civil recovery.

### Section 3: Social Services Overhaul

- Evidence-based intervention No child removal without court-reviewed medical evidence or immediate endangerment.

- Family-first policy Extended family must always be considered before foster care.

- Clear complaint and review systems All families to have right to third-party review of social services decisions.

- Ban early adoption planning No adoption discussions before a court has ruled on child safety and care eligibility.

- No bias-based accusations Both parents treated equally; no assumptions based on gender, income, or appearance.

- Permanent contact audits Any agency found coercing, threatening, or deceiving parents risks legal action and review.

- State support without seizure Financial struggles do not justify family separation.

### Case Studies Anonymous Lived Experience

1. A person taken into care at age 2.5 due to neglect was later adopted into a loving home. Years later, they were disinherited by an adoptive sibling despite years of family support. Record tracing attempts as an adult were unsuccessful due to poor archival practices.

2. Another parent lost custody after an emergency medical scare was misinterpreted. Despite no evidence of wrongdoing and a court ruling in their favor, they faced long-term supervision, false

accusations, and permanent access denial highlighting a system more reactive than protective.

This comprehensive policy prioritizes fairness, due process, and support without punishment.
